Students who place higher than the 104 level on Loyola's world language placement exam may be exempt from the world language core requirement, pending confirmation from Loyola's Modern Language department after a **proctored on-site** placement exam. Those students will need to complete 1 additional free elective in lieu of the foreign language core.
